



Brother H. L. Spence was called home by the lord on Monday, December 8, 1986. Harold Lee Spence was born to Harold Joel Spence and Geneva Spence on October 30, 1941, in Pampa, Texas. He was saved at 9 years of age and baptized by the Missionary Baptist Church in Sunnyvale, California.

On December 8, 1962, Brother Spence married Sharon Irene Bevis, then a member of the Landmark Church, San Jose, California. Born to Brother and



Sister Spence were two beautiful daughters, Shelly and Stacey, which, along with their respective husbands, are faithfully serving the Lord in His church in Clovis.

Brother Spence surrendered to the ministry at Landmark MBC, San Jose, California in 1969 and was ordained by Faith MBC, Concord, on November 6, 1970. Consequently, he spent 6 months as interim pastor at the Union City Mission, until he was called as pastor by the Vallejo MBC, California, where he served from 1970-1972. Brother Spence went to Cloverdale as State Missionary from 1972-1976. In April of 1976, the Porterville Church called him as missionary to Clovis, California, where he spent the balance of his ministry, leading the church from 9 in attendance at the outset to 152 at the time of his death.

He was not only a diligent preacher, but also a good teacher, engaging in the exhaustive study of the Word of God. fie attended the Missionary College at Sacramento, CMBI extension classes at Antioch and Clovis, and was both a student and faculty member of FMBI and CMBI. He stressed love and strong discipleship for new believers, forming his own discipleship program and developing many of the lessons in the discipleship book published by FMBI.

"A SOLDIER IN THE FAITH"

Bro. H.L. Spence was called home by the Lord on Monday, Dac, 8. 1980. Harold Lee Spence was born to Harold Joel Spence and Geneva Spence on October 30, 1941 in Pampa, Texas. At 2 years old he moved with his family to California. He was saved at 9 years old and baptized by MBC in Sunnyvale, Ca., Bro. Odom (pastor).

On December 8, 1962 H.L. married Sharon Irene Bevis, one of the members of Landmark Church, San Jose, Ca. Born to Bro. and Sis. Spence were two beautiful daughters; Shelly Lynn on April 25, 1964 and Stacey Lee on June 2, 1965. Both sisters are now married to two brothers, Mark and Alan Lohuis and are all serving God faithfully in the Clovis Church. There are three grandchildren; Garrett, Andrew, and Bradley.

H.L. was a graduate of San Jose High School and spent 3 years serving his country in Germany. Bro. Spence was a strong believer in education. After his military hitch, Bro. Spence spent over a total of ten years in both secular and seminary education as he majored in Speech and minored in History. He was a student at Santa Rosa City College for 2 years in which he was in a debate with an evolutionist and won overwhelmingly. This man was later saved, praise God. Those of us who sat under Bro. Spence's teaching, know by experience that we have never met anyone greater than he when it came to speech, debate or homiletics. Within his 10 years of education, he also attended Missionary Baptist College at Sacramento, CMBI extension classes at Antioch and Clovis, and was both a student and faculty member of FMBI and CMBI.

H.L. Spence surrendered to preach at Landmark MBC San Jose, Ca. in 1969, and ordained by Faith MBC Concord, Ca.on Nov. 6, 1970. From there he spent 6 months as interim pastor at the Union City Mission until called as pastor at the Vallejo MBC, Ca. from 1970 - 1972. Bro. Spence went to Cloverdale as State Missionary from 1972 - 1976. In April of 1976, the Porterville Church called him as Missionary to Clovis, Ca. where he spent the balanceof his ministry. Arriving in Clovis. counting his family, they made a total of 12 members meeting in a nursery school which the outgrew and moved to the American Legion Hall. About the time they filled that hall beyond capacity, they moved to the church plant which he led through Phase One of the building program. H.L. just recently led out and began the building program of Phase Two, Three, and Four. The Clovis MBC grew from 12 at the beginning of his pastorate to the Sunday before his death when the church ran 96 for Sunday School and the sactuary at capacity for preaching.

The norm is to speak greatly of a preacher gone to be with the Lord but in this case, the same words would be used if he were still with us. Bro. H.L. Spence ranked with the top when it came to his homoletic abilities. He believed and taught that Spiritual growth came through study and prayers. He prepared and delivered every message as though it was the most important one he would ever preach. God used this man in a mighty way!

His being a vessel for the Lord was the most important thing in his life. Not only a great preacher but also as good a teacher believing in the exhaustive study of the different books of the Word of God. He stressed love and strong discipleship for new believers. He formed his own discipleship program and outlines and developed many of the lessons in the discipleship book put out by FMBI. While a staff member there, he stressed to his students the importance of a well rounded ministry and several years of homeletics in seminary.

Those who knew Bro. Spence well, knew his many characteristics and gifts that made him special and stand out in any crowd. Not only a great pastor but a very close friend to all of us. So strong a sincerity and humor that he could make us cry one moment and laugh the next.

In our thoughts of Bro. H.L. Spence, let us remember him well and that we will all meet him again soon!

TO THE MEMORY OF

HAROLD LEE SPENCE

(October 30, 1941 - December 8, 1986)

This doctoral dissertation is dedicated to the memory of one of the finest Missionary Baptist preachers I have ever known. He went to be with the Lord rather early in life, but the effects of his ministry still endure. This dissertation is a product of that influence.

Harold "Hal" Spence and his family were members of Missionary Baptist Churches. He was saved at the age of 9. At the age of 17, he entered the U.S. Army and completed a tour of duty in Germany. On December 8, 1962, he married Sharon Irene Bevis and he became the father of two daughters, Shelly and Stacey. In 1965, he surrendered to the ministry and, in 1969, he was ordained and accepted the pastorate at Vallejo. Three years later, he became a missionary in Cloverdale, where he served for 4 years. He came to Clovis in 1976 to serve as a missionary at a work that consisted of 9 members. In 1979, the mission work organized into a church and Hal Spence served there as pastor until the time of his transition. By the time Hal Spence went to be with the Lord, the Clovis Missionary Baptist Church had grown to 152 members.

Hal Spence understood the need for ministerial education and training. He obtained an English Bible Diploma from the Missionary Baptist College in Sacramento and he attended Santa Rosa Jr. College, taking every speech class available. Having a heart burdened for the development of young preachers, he became an instructor with the Fresno Missionary Baptist Institute and the California Missionary Baptist Institute of Bellflower. He taught the subjects of Homiletics, Hermeneutics, and Defense of the Faith.

Hal Spence had a deep love for young preachers and a passion for Homiletics. He believed that Missionary Baptist ministers needed to be trained in Homiletics to be at their very best to preach God's Word. He believed that the pulpits of New Testament churches needed to be occupied by the most faithful and proficient preachers possible. He, constantly, encouraged young ministers to yield themselves to the Lord, so that they could become the best Bible preachers that God could develop.

Hal Spence earnestly desired to complete a dissertation in Homiletics for the edification of Missionary Baptist preachers. However, his ministry ended very abruptly. So in dedication to his loving memory, to his zeal for the Lord Jesus Christ, to his prosperous ministry, to his excellence in preaching, and to his love for young preachers, this work is faithfully submitted.

The old Cloverdale church had been disbanded and all property and monies given to us in trust to establish a new work in the Cloverdale area. Since the old Cloverdale church had only three active members and had not averaged more than six or seven in SS in the past several years, it was decided, after prayerful consideration, that this would be the wisest move.

God has placed His hand of approval on this work! In the last six months there have been eleven professions of faith. Of these six are adults and five of these have followed the Lord in baptism. We have also received seven by statement and one by letter. In all, the mission now has a membership of eighteen! Over the last six months the average attendance has been about twenty in SS. BTC and midweek attendance has steadily grown from an average of seven to last month's average thirteen.

The mission has recently moved to a new meeting place, and we feel this will greatly enhance the opportunity for further growth!

In the near future the mission will initiate Cloverdale's first and only bus ministry, and great things are expected this effort.

As we look forward to this coming associational year, we anticipate the salvation of many souls, the growth of new converts, and the establishment of strong scriptural New Testament churches, by the preaching of the gospel and the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ.
